Fingal. There are currently 60 members registered with the Network.

Members include:

- · facility managers
- supervisors and key staff
- volunteer management committee officers
- · volunteers who work in community centres

Members can share work experiences and exchange best practices in managing community centres with colleagues. The network promotes the sharing of skills across the 31 community centres and provides expertise in facility management, finance, business planning and offer supports such as training and development in areas like data protection or new changes in legislation.

With a population of 300,000 people, and an annual footfall over one million people per annum Fingal County Council supported facilities offer many avenues for people to come together and be part of their community, to be creative, to meet new people, banish loneliness, learn new skills, borrow a book, access Wi-Fi, play sport, go to the gym, listen to music, dance, sing, learn something new, bring your child to school, talk to other parents, be actively retired, visit an exhibition, the possibilities are endless and thanks to our wonderful diverse population the centres constantly evolve and change to adapt to what's needed.

Fingal Community Facilities Network Launch 'Connecting Communities' Information Booklet

The Fingal Community Facilities Network has launched an information booklet that provides information on the range of services, facilities and activities available across all of the 31 community facilities supported by Fingal County Council's Community Development Office.

The launch of the Fingal Community Facilities Network Information Booklet "Connecting Communities" by the Mayor of Fingal, Cllr Eoghan O'Brien took place at Donabate Portrane Community Centre.

The information booklet, compiled by the Fingal Community Facilities Network, provides a snap shot of what each community centre offers. It includes opening hours, activities, volunteering opportunities and what happens on a daily basis in any of the 31 Fingal County Council supported community facilities across Fingal, from Dublin 15 to Balbriggan and along the coast from Howth to Rush.

Each centre is a dynamic and independent not-for-profit community organisation with programs and services aimed at fostering social connections and wellbeing. By listening to community needs and interests the centres management teams identify what is needed and popular in each area.

In an effort to ensure no one is excluded, the information booklet will also be available in Irish, Polish and French languages and will be available on community centre and Fingal County Council web sites.

Speaking at the launch, Mayor of Fingal Cllr Eoghan O'Brien said: "Community Facilities help to build Communities and extends a hand of friendship to those living in isolation. Fingal County Council supported Community Facilities can offer a lifeline to people who have no support network, while providing spaces for groups to grow and develop significantly impacting their local Community. They offer opportunities for children and young people to engage in a wide range of activities and initiatives. They play a key role in building stronger communities."

MARATHONKIDS FINAL MILE IN MORTON STADIUM

87 schools and over 5,500 5th & 6th class students completed 25.2 miles over 8 weeks, training 4 times a week in school before completing the last mile at a specially organised 1-mile event on November 13th. Fingal County Council's Chief Executive AnnMarie Farrelly and Mayor of Fingal Cllr Eoghan O'Brien were in attendance at the final mile.

he MarathonKids Ireland Programme sees students train four times a week to run 25.2 miles over an eight-week period. Over 5,500 primary school students attending Fingal, South Dublin & Dublin City primary schools completed the final mile of their marathon on Wednesday 13th November in Morton Stadium, Santry.

Speaking at the event Mayor of Fingal Cllr Eoghan O'Brien said; "MarathonKids is a fantastic opportunity for 5th and 6th year students to get active as well as to learn about the importance of sports. I am delighted to see its return each year and to be here in Morton Stadium for the final mile. It was a pleasure to be joined by the Lord Mayor of Dublin, Paul McAuliffe and the Mayor of South Dublin, Vicki Casserly at the event."

Fingal County Council Chief Executive AnnMarie Farrelly said; "It is wonderful to see the rise in the numbers of students taking part in MartathonKids over the past four years, going from 800 students in 2015 to 5,500 this year. This really shows how worthwhile the programme is. I look forward to seeing its continued success for years to come."

This is the 5th year of the programme, which sees former Olympian and 400m European Champion, David Gillick, and MarathonKids Ireland Ambassador working with Fingal County Council, South Dublin County Council, Dublin City Sport and Wellbeing Partnership and Dublin Marathon to promote the programme.

The students are supplied with a workbook, which highlights the benefits of sport and is used as both a training guide and learning tool for in classroom use. Over the years that the MarathonKids programme has taken place and it has seen the numbers grow from 800 students and 22 schools in 2015 to 5,500 students from 87 schools this year.

Inspired by a similar programme in the US, Fingal County Council Sports Officer Niall McGuirk and MarathonKids Ireland Director Neil Kennedy created a programme that combines four running sessions per week with a class workbook that links into the SPHE subject in the school curriculum. The workbook highlights the benefits of sport and contribution to a child's overall physical and mental well-being.

Former Olympian and 400m European Champion and MarathonKids Ireland Ambassador David Gillick visited schools in the council areas to talk about the programme and the importance of students being aware of the benefits of physical activity.

David praised the inclusive nature of the programme as being beneficial to children who don't have an interest in sports but want to be active: "As someone who was involved

in all sports in school, I also appreciate that there were other kids who didn't do as much activity. MarathonKids is open to everyone regardless of their ability and a fantastic opportunity for kids to get active."

"My Mum saw the flyer at the library, brought it home and nudged me saying, 'I think you'll be good at this'," Beverley explained. I've cared deeply about the environment since my primary school days, and I was reminded by my Mum that I won a Poster Competition for recycling when I was eight years of age."

When Beverley was 18 on a scholarship programme to Brazil, (The Prime Minister's Global Fellowship Programme headed by the then [UK] Prime Minister Gordon Brown), she interned for the Multi National Corporation KPMG under its Corporate Social Responsibility Department.

"I had the privilege of hearing passionate activists talk about the impact of Climate Change and have taken it rather seriously since then."

Representing Blanchardstown's Europe Direct Information Centre alongside the Under 18 regional champion Emily O'Shea from Portmarnock Community School, Beverley was ecstatic to win the top prize of \in 1,000 and a trip to Brussels, where she will receive a tour of the European Parliament and other EU institutions.

"I feel great," she smiled. "It's really a privilege. It was such a nice event as well and there was a really great atmosphere."

Looking forward to the trip to Brussels, Beverley is also excited to publish her first children's book early next year under Olympia publishers entitled 'Ernest and the Prince of Peace'.

Congratulating both Beverley and Emily on their fantastic performances at the National Final, Manager of the Blanchardstown Europe Direct Information Centre, Siobhan Walshe added; "Beverley was a worthy winner at the Regional Final in Blanchardstown, and her passion for the topic shone through her speech. ANNMARIE FARRELLY APPOINTED AS THE NEW CHIEF EXECUTIVE OF FINGAL COUNTY COUNCIL

Fingal County Council has formally appointed AnnMarie Farrelly as its new Chief Executive.

t a special meeting today (Friday, November 1), the Elected members of Fingal County Council passed a resolution to appoint Ms Farrelly to the Chief Executive position. The Corporate Policy Group had last week unanimously supported the recommendation of the Public Appointments Service.

Welcoming the appointment Mayor of Fingal Cllr Eoghan O'Brien said: "I was delighted to support the recommendation of the Public Appointments Commission to appoint AnnMarie Farrelly. I firmly believe that she is the right person to lead our Local Authority. She is an exemplary public servant whose knowledge of the sector is second to none. AnnMarie Farrelly is a true professional and someone who displays the utmost respect for her colleagues in Fingal County Council and the Elected Members."

Ms Farrelly becomes the sixth person, and first woman, to take over the role of Chief Executive/County Manager of Fingal County Council, which is celebrating its 25th anniversary this year. She has held the position of Interim Chief Executive since May following the departure of Paul Reid to become CEO of the Health Service Executive.

Speaking on her appointment, Ms Farrelly said it was an "honour and a privilege" to be appointed as Chief Executive of Fingal County Council.

"I have achieved this ultimate leadership role because of the tremendous experience and career opportunities local government has afforded me. It has always been a privilege to work in local government and to work in a County like Fingal makes it even better."

"The County has transformed since the Council was established in 1994. Over the past 25 years, for example, our population has doubled to 300,000. Our rates income, which was \in 3.7m back in 1994, has risen to \in 129m this year. This level of growth is an indication of our success but has also presented some challenges, which we will continue to address."

She added: "I want to build on our achievements to date and I will work with the Council to ensure that the County continues to prosper and to ensure we protect the quality of life of the people who live here by helping to address their housing, economic and recreational needs.

"I also want to ensure that Fingal remains a vibrant, outwardlooking and well-run council and that we embrace opportunity and diversity. We will need to take a lead on issues such as Climate Action, public transport improvement, employment and housing.

"As a local authority we need to protect, manage and improve what we have and to plan and prepare for our future sustainable growth and expansion. It is also important that we perform our core responsibilities well and I do intend to keep a focus on this area, particularly on our roles as regulator."

Ms Farrelly concluded: "I will continue with my management team and staff, to deliver essential projects including housing delivery on public lands at Donabate, the continued transformation of Swords, the regeneration of Balbriggan, the Coastal Way, as well as important projects in Dublin 15 such as the Snugborough Interchange Upgrade, and to ensure a good quality of life for all our citizens both young and old."





The RTB and the Fingal Housing Department are inviting landlords in Fingal County and surrounding counties to take part in its free, one-day accreditation course on Saturday, 30th November at the Clayton Hotel Dublin Airport.

> The Betterlet: RTB Landlord Accreditation scheme aims to support landlords to gain a stronger understanding of their rental rights and responsibilities, as well as equip them with the knowledge of the latest legislative changes that effect their new or existing tenancies.

Commenting on the new partnership and the benefits of the Betterlet scheme, Caren Gallagher, RTB Head of Communications and Research, said; "We are delighted to be partnering with Fingal County Council's Housing Department to jointly deliver this Betterlet training session. Landlords play a vital role in providing healthy and safe homes for people across the country. By delivering these sessions together, we hope to be able to support landlords in navigating the complex regulatory framework governing the rental sector – from the latest rental law changes to guiding landlords through a local authority inspection.

Our accredited scheme enables participating landlords to set themselves apart in the rental sector and be recognised as professionals providing a high-quality service. Accredited landlords will also be better informed and more confident in their ability to apply and adhere to the regulations under which they must operate, helping to mitigate any unnecessary penalties or disputes with tenants."

The accreditation course will take place from 10:00am to 5:00pm and will cover the following areas, which have been updated with the latest legislative changes:

- Pre-tenancy guidance
- · How to manage a tenancy throughout from beginning to end
- Rights and responsibilities landlord and tenant
- Dispute prevention and what to do if things go wrong
- Minimum standards how to ensure your property is compliant with the minimum standards
- Rent Pressure Zone qualification criteria and exemptions
- How to end a tenancy information on how to correctly serve notice and what reasons can be relied upon

Participants' accreditation will be subject to a short assessment at the end of the course and once awarded, accreditation is valid



for two years.

Fingal County Council's Director of Housing, Margaret Geraghty, adds; "Fingal County Council is delighted to partner with the RTB in this Initiative and is the first of its kind to be rolled out in Fingal.

Fingal County Council recognises the invaluable role landlords have in providing homes for tenants in private rented accommodation within our administrative area. The aim of the BetterLet scheme is to provide free training to landlords designed to better inform them of their rights and responsibilities, policy and regulatory changes in the sector and how to successfully manage tenancies.

In 2017, Fingal set up a new unit in the Housing Department with responsibility for proactively inspecting all private rented properties in Fingal to ensure compliance with the relevant regulations. To date, this unit has carried out in excess of 5,000 private rented property inspections since 2017 and has exceeded the targets set by the Department of Housing for the inspection of private rented dwellings. There are currently 21,034 registered private rented properties in Fingal.

Baxter Real Estate During 2019, the property market saw a stabilisation in house prices.

This trend was evident to varying degrees in the Dublin 15 market, with sales up to €400,000 attracting good demand, but at the upper end, price reductions became more commonplace as the year progressed.



hile stock levels of second-hand properties remained similar to 2018 levels, the supply of new homes was more evident with many new phases coming to the market. Such Dublin 15 schemes included Hamilton Park, Riverwood Square,

Fairhaven, Barnwell Wood, Hansfield, Castlefield Hall, Hollywoodrath, Rathborne Park and Royal Canal Park.

This increased supply is a significant factor for price stabilisation, but the Central bank rules restricting income multiples to 3.5 times of a person's salary, along with deposit requirements, are also feeding into the

market. Throughout the year, the effects of Brexit were also noticed as key dates came and went, and with uncertainty comes lower confidence levels.

With the economy continuing to perform well, and with low unemployment levels, the signs point to another year of steady demand in 2020 with price stabilisation and, in some areas, continuing price reductions, in particular for houses requiring modernisation works. The aforementioned is also somewhat dependent on an orderly Brexit.

Dublin 15 will also see the arrival of more new housing schemes, providing further options for buyers.

Financial Assistance Scheme for 2020 Events and Festivals

Fingal County Council's Events Unit has launched its call for applications for groups and organisations seeking financial assistance for Festivals and Events taking place in 2020.



pplications will be accepted for existing and/or new events or festivals which animate public spaces in creative and innovative ways and which are focused on developing measurable tourism impacts in the County.

Interested parties must meet a number of other eligibility criteria including:"

- · Have a general audience appeal and be socially inclusive.
- Clearly demonstrate potential to generate economic, social and/ or cultural benefits.
- Complement the County's calendar of events in relation to attracting overseas' visitors.

- Meet the Events Unit's objective of compiling a varied programme of events throughout the year including content, seasonal and geographical spread.
- Demonstrate financial sustainability and the capacity to develop the event.
- Have a clear PR and marketing plan including a social media strategy to actively promote the event.

Fingal County Council's Events Unit supports tourism through the Fingal Statement of Tourism Strategy 2017 - 2022 and businesses in our towns through a wide-ranging programme of events.

Since the formation of the Events Unit in 2010, the number of events being held and supported annually has increased year on year. The programme is a combination of Fingal County Council's own events, events in partnership with other bodies that have similar objectives, and events run by external organisers who receive direct funding contributions from Fingal County Council through a financial assistance programme.

The closing date for applications for funding is on Tuesday 17th December 2019 at 3pm for events taking place in 2020.

Councillors approve €619m Capital Programme

Councillors approved a Capital Programme worth €619m at tonight's monthly meeting of Fingal County Council in County Hall, Swords.

he three-year rolling programme runs from 2020 to 2022 across seven divisions and represents a €30.63m increase on the 2019-2021 Capital Programme and a 91% increase on the €324m provided for in the 2017-2019 Capital Programme.

A total of 236 projects are included with an estimated spend of \in 187m in 2020. The following year, 2021, capital expenditure will be in the region of \in 233m with \in 209m earmarked for 2022.

Fingal County Council Interim Chief Executive AnnMarie Farrelly said: "Given Fingal's importance to the national economy and the Greater Dublin region, it is important that our capital budget is spent strategically, and I believe we have achieved this in our 2020-2022 Capital Programme. There is a strong emphasis on housing and infrastructure as well as economic and community development while our commitment to Climate Change is reflected in the continued roll-out of LED Street lighting, Electric Vehicle Charging Points and increased cycling infrastructure."

Almost half of the Capital Programme will be spent on housing as the Council continues its commitment to fully engage with the Rebuilding Ireland Action Plan for Housing and Homelessness. Over €94m has been earmarked for housing in 2020 with €208m due to be spent over the following two years.

Planning and Strategic Infrastructure projects, such as the Snugborough Road Interchange in Dublin 15, will account for €36m in 2020 and there is a total commitment of €151m over the three-year period of the Capital Programme.

Provision has also been made for cycling infrastructure :

and there is a planned expenditure of €43mm over the three years on Greenway Projects such as the Broadmeadow Way, Fingal Coastal Way and Royal Canal Urban Greenway. Cycling infrastructure is also being included the road investment programme which includes projects such as the R135 North Road, Ballycoolin Road and Swords to Malahide Estuary.

Economic Enterprise and Tourism Development will account for almost \in 73m with \in 23m being spent in 2020 on projects such as Our Balbriggan and Howth Courthouse as well as the purchase of development lands and the servicing and improvement of existing industrial lands.

The development of the Swords Cultural Quarter will continue over the next three years and the project is expected to ramp up considerably in 2020 following the announcement that Turner and Townsend have been appointed as Project Manager. The Cultural Quarter includes existing buildings such as Swords Castle, The Atrium at County Hall and Carnegie Hall on North Street while a new Civic Centre and County Library is to be built on the junction of North Street and Seatown Road.

Over €13m will be spent on Community infrastructure over the next three years including the progression of Community Centre projects in Meakstown and Baldoyle.

The Council's commitment to introduce LED street lighting continues with \in 5.3m due to be spent over the next three years including \in 2.4m in 2020 and 2021.

The Capital Programme is funded from a variety of sources including levies, loans, grants and the Council's own revenue streams.



Pilot project to engage with unheard voices through the Fingal Voices app is launched by Fingal County Council

An innovative pilot project to engage with traditionally unheard voices through the Fingal Voices smartphone app has been launched by Fingal County Council. Fingal Voices is an app which allows citizens to ask questions, respond to surveys and engage in dialogue with Council departments.

s users engage with the app, they gain points which can be redeemed for various prizes. Geolocation technology is used to match users with questions and surveys relevant to them, such as events they are attending or issues affecting their locality. A beta version of the app is being rolled out which will be evaluated during the pilot project, which will run from October 23 2019 to January 31 2020.

The launch event at Swords Castle chapel involved a showcase of the app by Grégoire Piette, co-founder of Smart Futures who designed the app as part of the Unheard Voices project, a collaboration between Enterprise Ireland, Cork City Council and Smart Dublin.



CHRISTMAS MINCE PIE LITTLE VILLAGE STYLE

Christmas time always brings back memories of, and in no particular order; the anticipation of the family getting together, Christmas mass, Santa, Christmas dinner, the hope of a white Christmas and enjoying a mince pie in front of a warm fire! Little Village has decided to share with you a recipe to make your very own Christmas Mince Pies.

INGREDIENTS

- 450g Plain Flour
- 2 Eggs
- 900g of mincemeat (available in all supermarkets)
- 250g of Butter
- Icing sugar
- 250g of Golden caster sugar

METHOD

1. Begin by preheating your oven to 200C.

2. Take out some cooking tins, the same tins as you would use for making buns. Lightly grease the tins with butter, only lightly grease them please!

3. Grab yourself a big mixing bowl as we have used enough ingredients to feed all the extended family! Once you have the mixing bowl to hand, put all the flour and the sugar into the bowl and mix well. It is important to ensure you give the two ingredients a good mix.

4. Next, cut the butter into smaller pieces and place them in the mixing bowl and prepare for your hands to get greasy as you really need to mix the butter through the flour and sugar.



5. Following this, crack the eggs and beat them in a small bowl.

6. Add the eggs to the mixing bowl with some water if needed and mix all the ingredients together.

7. Have your cooking board ready and sprinkle some flour onto the bowl and place the contents of the mixing bowl onto the board and knead.

8. Next you must carefully roll the pastry and cut to whichever shape you want for effect. It is advised to use some cutters; star or circle cutters if you have them available. It is best to cut your pasty to fit the tins you have previously greased. 9. Cut the pastry to the size of the tin and place this in each small bun tin.

10. Following this, place a teaspoon of the mincemeat mix into each bun tin and then place the circle or star shaped pastry on top to complete each mince pie.

11. Place in the preheated oven for about 15 minutes until you can see that the mince pies have turned golden brown on top.

12. Carefully, using gloves remove the tins form the oven and lightly sprinkle your icing sugar over each mince pie.

13. Serve to all your happy and lucky guests and ENJOY!

Fingal County Council declare Halloween Amnesty for combustible material an overwhelming success

Fingal County Council has declared its Halloween amnesty which allowed householders dispose of combustible material for free as an overwhelming success.

s part of its commitment to protecting the environment and its contribution to the Safer Halloween initiative, the local authority's recycling centres in Swords and Coolmine in Dublin 15 accepted a range of material such as

mattresses, sofas and wooden doors on four separate days in the build-up to October 31.

The response was overwhelming from the general public with over 4,000 vehicles passing through the Estuary centre. 86 skips were filled, along with 40 cages of small electrical waste, a huge amount of large electrical items and 35 crates of paint.

In Coolmine, 2,645 vehicles visited which saw 79 skips filled during the four specified days of the Amnesty.

Mayor of Fingal Cllr Eoghan O'Brien commended the local authority for the initiative. "The Halloween Amnesty was a massive success and was enthusiastically supported by the general public. Along with the Festival of Fire initiative, Fingal County Council can be proud of the role it played in ensuring a Safer Halloween for everyone."

Director of Operations David Storey: "This year we made the decision to offer the annesty to reduce the amount of material which may otherwise be disposed of on bonfires locally with consequent health and safety risks and damage to public open spaces and have are delighted with the overwhelming positive reaction from the public."

"The initiative involved a considerable financial investment from Fingal County Council as part of its commitment to reducing the environmental impact on green areas and open spaces over the Halloween period. Fingal County Council hosted the launch of the 19th edition of the Dublin Economic Monitor where it was revealed that the capital is close to full employment, with the areas of finance, insurance and real estate activities hitting all-time highs, supported by Brexit relocations.

embers of the business community, along with Mayor of Fingal Cllr Eoghan O'Brien as well as local councillors and Fingal County Council's Director of Services for Economic, Enterprise & Tourism Development Emer O'Gorman, attended the launch at Newbridge House in Donabate.

The quarterly report, produced by EY-DKM Economic Advisory, examines a range of economic indicators driving the city's growth, including employment, property and rental prices, housing commencements, hotel rates and public transport use, to determine its economic performance from the height of the boom to the economic crash and subsequent recovery.

Commenting on the report, Ciara Morley, Senior Consultant at EY-DKM Economic Advisory, said: "Dublin Tourism showed growth of 8.3% in Q3, however UK tourist spending contracted for the third consecutive quarter indicating that UK tourists are considering postponing foreign trips as they reassess their expenditure in light of Brexit. The CEO of Tourism Ireland has called uncertainty the most pressing issue for the sector. Budget 2020 provides the tourism sector with a contingency fund of €40 million to insulate against Brexit-related shocks."

Ms Morley added that nationally tourist spend has increased with both USA and China showing consecutive

years of growth and that new opportunities in emerging markets particularly in the East should have positive effects on tourism in Ireland.

Launching the report, Mayor of Fingal Cllr Eoghan O'Brien said: "Fingal County Council continues to work to develop the local economy. The Dublin Enterprise Zone in Dublin 15 is going from strength to strength, now employing over 20,000 people. The Council will continue to support and invest in the Dublin Enterprise Zone and in the Stephenstown Industrial Estate in Balbriggan as part of the Our Balbriggan Rejuvenation Plan."

Minister confirms €300,000 spent on short-term repairs to pyrite contaminated primary schools

The Minister for Education has confirmed that almost €300,000 has been spent on short-term repairs to primary schools whose foundations are contaminated by pyrite, including St Patricks NS, Diswellstown and Castleknock Educate Together. The information emerged from a Dail question that the Green Party TDs submitted on behalf of Green Party Dublin West candidate Cllr. Roderic O'Gorman.

t a recent meeting with the Principal and Board of Management of St Patricks NS in Diswellstown, I was shown the ongoing damage occurring in the school due to the presence of pyrite in its foundations. Following the meeting, I asked the Green Party TDs to put a question to the Minister for Education regarding how many schools in the country were contaminated with pyrite and how much was being spent on short term repairs", stated Cllr. O'Gorman

"The Minister responded to say five national schools across Dublin

had pyrite in their foundations and that substantial sums of money had been spent so far in undertaking short term repairs, including €167,000 in St. Patricks NS. Funding has also been approved for Castleknock Educate Together NS deal with damaged floors, doors and paths, though the amount was not announced as it is currently commercially sensitive. In total, almost €300,000 has been spent on short term repairs to these schools, with further costs still being incurred".

"The Minister also stated that legal action was being taken against some of the companies involved. However, it would appear that until this legal action has been resolved, the long term solution needed for these schools, which is the complete removal of all pyrite from their foundations, will not go ahead. Instead, the schools will have to face the ongoing disruption of gradual damage being caused by pyrite and money being spent on short-term repairs – money which would be better invested in actual education infrastructure".

"The Minister needs to stop waiting for the outcome of the legal case, and devise a plan to quickly remove pyrite from all these schools. This is going to have to happen sooner or later, and the sooner the Minister acts, the less disruption children and teachers in these schools will face and the less of the Department's money that will be wasted on continuous, short-term repairs" concluded Cllr. O'Gorman.

Funding for Community Enhancement in Fingal

Fingal County Council has been allocated funds of €150,521.00 under the 2019 Community Enhancement Programme and an additional €13,089.00 for Men and Women's sheds.

he Community Enhancement Programme is funded by the Department of Rural and Community Development. It provides funding to communities to enhance facilities in areas of disadvantage. LCDC's are responsible for allocating funding to projects in their area as they are ideally placed to identify suitable local projects.

The LCDC met yesterday (Wednesday, October 2) to approve funding for a total of 101 applications for both schemes in the Fingal area. 90 applications were approved under CEP 2019 and 11 applications approved for Men's & Women's Sheds Fund 2019.

The Department of Rural & Community Development recommended that funding for sheds should be allocated in a relatively equal manner across eligible sheds who submitted a valid

application. All Men's Sheds in Ireland affiliated with the Irish Men's Shed Association were eligible to apply. Women's Sheds were also eligible to apply.

Under the Community Enhancement Programme. Swords Community First Responders, Balbriggan Cricket Club and Barnardos Corduff were among the 90 groups awarded funding.

Valid applications were received from 10 Men's Sheds and 1 Women's Shed in the Fingal area. The Funding Sub Group met and agreed to divide this year's Men's and Women's Shed fund of €13,089.00 equally between the 11 sheds' as per the Department's guidelines.

Fingal County Council's Director of Economic, Enterprise and Tourism Development, Emer O'Gorman said: "We are delighted with the funding secured for 2019 which will allow substantial investment in communities across Fingal. We look forward to working with many communities and voluntary groups and assisting them in delivering their projects."

Fingal County Council's Interim Chief Executive, AnnMarie Farrelly said: "Fingal County Council is very proud of its record in supporting community groups and community facilities. This funding will help community groups considerably going forward."

he 2019 - 20 programme was officially launched by Mayor of Fingal, Cllr Eoghan O'Brien and Fingal County Council's Chief Executive AnnMarie Farrelly, in the company of former Republic of Ireland senior international Andy Reid and under 19s international team manager Tom Mohan at Corduff Community Centre today.

Over the course of the 2019-20 school year, the 25 Transition Year students participating in the programme will mix academic subjects such as Maths and English with a range of football coaching courses and modules in Fitness Instruction, Media Skills and Personal Development as well football training and strength and conditioning work. In addition, the participants will undertake an ITEC Fitness Instructors Course delivered by Litton Lane Fitness Training. They will also return to their local primary school one day a week to work with teachers in the delivery of physical education and gain valuable work experience.

"Participants from the last three programmes were given the opportunity to immerse themselves in football for a year while also meeting their educational needs.

Following its success, the programme will be delivered for a fourth year, it is designed to allow the students to commit

to the development of their football skills as well as engaging with their communities without compromising their education," said course co-ordinator, and co-funded FAI Development Officer with Fingal County Council, Denis Hyland.

The programme is being jointly delivered by Fingal County Council's Sports Office and the Football Association of Ireland with assistance from Empower Blanchardstown.

Speaking at the event, Rory O'Byrne stated that, 'We have an extensive Arts Office programme of opportunities and initiatives informed by priority policy areas, complemented by the work of two thriving arts centres - Draiocht in Blanchardstown and the Seamus Ennis Arts Centre in the Naul.'

'This plan takes account of recent developments locally and nationally. Over the next seven years, we will focus our efforts by making space for art, connecting people and ideas, enabling excellence, and developing our capacity to deliver this plan optimally.'

The content of the plan was informed by a process of public consultation that took place over six weeks from May to June 2018. The first stage of public consultation took the form of an online survey. The second stage of the consultation employed the 'World Café' methodology, whereby the Arts Office hosted two half-day workshops with invited stakeholders.

The Arts Office consulted with young people through their Youth & Education Programme to ensure that Fingal's significant youth demographic had their voices heard and considered in the planning and delivery of arts and cultural services in Fingal. In addition, a workshop with the Public Participation Network was hosted by the Arts Office.

AnnMarie Farrelly, Chief Executive, said, 'Fingal County Council is celebrating its 25th anniversary this year, and from the very beginning the arts have been recognised as being essential to the life and wellbeing of our community. We are proud of our service which continues to help shape the culture of our county and to make it a better place to live, work and visit'.

Art O'Leary, Secretary-General to the President, praised the :

work of the art office and commented, 'Fingal is evidently a local authority committed to supporting artists and people of all ages through a quality service that reaches out across people, place and practice. It is the best arts plan that I have read to date'.

Guests were invited to experience two special exhibitions programmed for the occasion, which align with the planning and vision for Swords as a site for contemporary art in the context of the proposed new Cultural Masterplan.

Artist Michele Hetherington presented Talk softly, new sitespecific work at Swords Castle. Hetherington is a local Fingal artist and was the recipient of the Fingal Arts Graduate Award in 2018.

Alan James Burns presented Silicon Synapse, a Virtual Reality and psycho-acoustic installation in the historic Carnegie Library, Swords. This artwork is jointly commissioned by Fingal County Council and the European Commission's SciArt programme and is funded by Arts Council of Ireland Open Call Award.

The arts plan also features the artwork of photographer Rich Gilligan. Originally a native of Fingal, Gilligan has been commissioned by Fingal Arts Office to document and capture the cultural landscape of the county. This process began in August 2019 and will continue through 2020.

Rory O'Byrne concluded that, 'The arts plan is a celebration of the people and places that define our great county, and we look forward to working with as many people as possible over the coming years to realise our purpose - to bring the arts to life in Fingal and Fingal to life through the Arts'. 
