Sports Capital & Equipment Programme 2023

The government recently announced increased thresholds for local and regional projects. The Sports Capital and Equipment Programme supports the development of sports facilities and the purchase of non-personal sports equipment. These grants are available to voluntary, not-for profit sports clubs. community groups, national governing bodies (NGBs) of sport and local authorities, third level colleges, education, and training Boards (ETBs) and schools may only apply for funding jointly with sports clubs or organisations.

Clubs that are not already registered can be registered at www.sportscapitalprogramme.ie. The local project maximum grant has been increased from €150,000 to €200,000 & regional project grant has been increased from €300,000 to €500.000. Applications can be made online only from 9am on 17th July till 8th September at 5pm. A guide to making an application can be found in this link: gov.ie/sportscapital.

Ireland's first Cycle friendly (Dutch Style) Roundabout – Church Fields Link Road

Fingal County Council recently opened Ireland's very first Dutch style roundabout. Iocated on the Churchfields Link Road. The roundabout is a part of the Phase1 of the link road and wider project which includes walking and cycling upgrades on peripheral local roads.

This Dutch style roundabout will give an elevated level of comfort and safety to people who are cycling and driving through the roundabout and will slow down vehicle speeds.

New Hollywoodrath Speed Ramps

Speed ramps have been installed on the long stretch of the Hollystown Road, at a total cost of €5,000. Some of the residents of the Hollystown area had requested for these ramps to be installed to curb the speeding of cars on the Hollywoodrath roads and I'm hopeful it will help address this issue.



My Idea for a Swimming Pool for Tyrrelstown and Hollystown

I have requested for a new swimming pool to be built within the Tyrrelstown/Hollystown areas to accommodate for the lack of recreational activities that will help tackle antisocial behaviour within the community. Work is underway on the Fingal Sports and Physical Activity Plan 2023 to 2028. This will address Fingal's strategic direction in relation to sport over the next 5 years.

This plan will be completed at the end of this summer. A facilities audit of sport and recreational activities across the country has been commissioned and this project is progressing through the procurement process.

UPDATE ON CASTLEKNOCK TO BLANCHARDSTOWN CYCLE PATH

Fingal Council has confirmed that the Castleknock to Blanchardstown via Farmleigh cycle route is included on the National Transport Authority's (NTA) 5 year implementation plan.

- Funding has been made available through the 2023 NTA Active Travel investment grants allocations to progress the project.
- The tender process to appoint designers is underway and the Active Travel team plan to appoint a consultant later this summer.

COMMITMENT TO IMPROVE SAFETY AT COOLMINE ROUNDABOUT

Following concerns raised with me by residents in Carpenterstown about safety at the Coolmine roundabout, I submitted a motion at our Area Committee on 22 June requesting a new pedestrian crossing at this roundabout which is close to Coolmine train station. This roundabout is very heavily used by traffic and currently has no designated pedestrian crossing or traffic calming - we need to provide much better protection for pedestrians and cyclists here.

The Active Travel department of Fingal Council gave a commitment that raised pedestrian crossings for Coolmine roundabout would be included in the scheme for the Castleknock to Blanchardstown cycle route: 'Coolmine roundabout will form part of this scheme. It is envisaged that a designer will be appointed in 2023 and an Options Report will follow circa 8-9 months afterwards, which will include options for the Coolmine Roundabout.'

The Operations department will aim to deliver this element for the Coolmine roundabout in advance of the rest of the scheme.

KELLYSTOWN CEMETERY

There has been a long delay in delivering a new cemetery at Kellystown. Fingal Council has agreed terms with the landowner for the acquisition of land for the construction of a burial ground at Kellystown and this was approved by Councillors in June. Funding of €2 million for the cemetery works has been provided in the capital programme for 2023-2025. A tender process has to be completed and it is expected that construction will take approximately 12 months from the start of the project. I will be seeking another update on this project in the autumn.



NEW LOCAL OBJECTIVE FOR SAFE PEDESTRIAN/CYCLE ACCESS AT GRANARD BRIDGE

The humpback bridge across the Maynooth line and Canal at Castleknock train station (Granard Bridge) is currently unsafe for pedestrians and cyclists due to the narrow footpath and restricted roadspace on the bridge. I proposed a new Local Objective (PA SH 13.8) to address safety concerns, which is included in the Fingal Development Plan 2023-29:

 'Promote pedestrian and cycle connectivity across the Canal and rail line in the vicinity of Granard Bridge, Castleknock.'



A new bridge on the Laurel Lodge side of Granard Bridge is crucial to provide for safe access at this bridge for walkers and cyclists. I recently received an update on how this objective will be delivered. Question: Councillor J. Walsh: "To ask the Chief Executive to provide an update on plans to provide safe connectivity for pedestrians and cyclists at/or adjacent to Granard Bridge, Castleknock?" Reply: The Planning & Strategic Infrastructure Department is currently preparing tender documentation...on a number of sustainable transport projects for the Dublin 15 area. Improved connectivity at this particular location, possibly in the form of a new pedestrian and cycle bridge, is to be included in the scope of works and will be one of the first projects to be commenced as part of this procurement. A consultant is likely to be appointed in Q3 2023 to take this project forward.



Fingal County Council joins forces with "Think Before You Flush" Campaign to protect Blue Flag Beaches

Tuesday, 27th June 2023 – In a landmark collaboration, Fingal County Council has come together with other local authorities from coastal regions across Ireland to pledge their commitment to the "Think Before You Flush" campaign on all Blue Flag Beaches. This initiative aims to raise awareness about the detrimental effects of flushing instead of binning sanitary products on our natural environment including beaches and promote responsible waste management practices among beachgoers.











he "Think Before You Flush" campaign, operated by Clean Coasts in partnership with Uisce Éireann, emphasises the importance of appropriate flushing behaviour and disposal of items including wipes and other sanitary products in the bin, even if they are labelled as flushable. Only the 3 Ps, pee, poo and paper should be flushed down the toilet. When items such as wipes and sanitary products are flushed down the toilet, they can cause serious blockages in sewage systems, leading to sewage overflows and ultimately polluting coastal waters and beaches.

Recognising the urgent need to protect Ireland's remarkable coastal ecosystems, Fingal County Council has united with other coastal local authorities around Ireland in their commitment to spread awareness about the campaign and promote responsible waste disposal practices.

Under this collaborative effort, participating councils will display Think Before You Flush signage on Blue Flag Beaches, offering clear instructions on appropriate flushing behaviour, highlighting the main items people incorrectly flush down their toilets (the 'Dirty Dozen') and encouraging visitors to use designated sanitary waste bins.

By partnering with Clean Coasts and Uisce Éireann's Think Before You Flush campaign, Fingal County Council aims to foster a culture of environmental responsibility, where individuals can take proactive steps to protect our coastal habitats. The success of this campaign hinges on the participation and support of Fingal's coastal stakeholders, including the public, beachgoers, residents, and tourists alike.

Sinead McCoy, Coastal Communities Manager at Clean Coasts, expressed her enthusiasm for Fingal County Council's collaborative efforts and support of the campaign.

"We are thrilled to see Fingal County Council and communities from coastal regions across Ireland joining forces to champion the 'Think Before You Flush' campaign on our cherished Blue Flag Beaches. This joint commitment not only underscores Fingal County Council's dedication to promoting environmental practices but also highlights shared responsibility for our coastal communities."

Talking about the importance of safeguarding our water and our local environment including our Blue Flag beaches Tom Cuddy, Uisce Éireann said: "Everyday people flush thousands of sanitary items such as wet wipes and cotton buds down the toilet instead of simply putting them in the bin. This causes blockages in our network, pumping stations and wastewater treatment plants and can lead to sewage overflows impacting some of our most beautiful coastal and river locations. We clear approximately 10,000 blockages from our wastewater network every year."

Tom continued: "We are delighted to continue our partnership with Clean Coasts and collaborate with local councils and communities including those with Blue Flag beaches to preserve and protect our environment and shine a light on the link between what you flush down the toilet and can end up on your local beach."

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Phoenix Park Parking Charges

Councillor Colm O'Rourke slams Phoenix Park parking charges as residents voice their outrage



esidents living close to Phoenix Park fear that plans to introduce a car parking tariff will negatively impact local communities

Friday, 19 May 2023

Cllr Colm O'Rourke, local resident and Fine Gael Councillor has criticised plans from the Office of Public Works (OPW) to introduce car parking charges across the entire Phoenix Park.

The proposal to introduce the tariff is part of the Phoenix Park Draft Parking Strategy, which includes 24 recommendations on the future of parking in the Phoenix Park. An online consultation survey regarding the proposals is currently open to gauge the public's views and will close on Monday, 6 June 2023.

There is a growing concern in communities near the Phoenix Park that the car parking charges will negatively impact residents and that the proposal is not a genuine environmental initiative.

Cllr Colm O'Rourke commented that "As someone who has a record of supporting environmental initiatives and has worked to achieve greener communities, this is not a genuine environmental initiative as it will not stop people travelling by car but rather push the car parking, illegal parking, traffic congestion, blocked footpaths and other issues from the Phoenix Park into communities across the Navan Road, Ashtown, Cabra and other areas.

"Rather than pushing the issue from one jurisdiction controlled by the Office of Public Works (OPW) to another jurisdiction controlled by Dublin City Council, the root cause of the issue should be tackled to ensure we have a greener Park but also to ensure that our communities are protected.

Cllr O'Rourke added that "There are several proposals in the Phoenix Park Parking Strategy that are very much welcome and exciting such as increased cycle parking, increased cycle hire and the possibility of enhanced public transport availability/reintroduction of a shuttle bus within and close to the Park but parking charges would negatively impact our community. There are parking issues in the Park on a certain number of days in the year, mainly weekends in the summer, therefore a blanket 365 day parking charge is not appropriate.

Responding to the large volume of feedback from residents, Cllr O'Rourke stated: "More and more residents are becoming aware of this proposal, and as a result, I have received a huge volume of residents queries to say that it would be a move in the wrong direction for the nearby communities. Residents fear that the car parking charge proposal will not force the public to use public transport but rather see people park their vehicles in nearby communities, on footpaths, on grass verges, and congest our communities that should be liveable, breathable, with spaces for people to use and streets for kids to play."



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The Royal Canal

SCAM EFLOW TEXT MESSAGES

A text message scam telling recipients they owe toll charges to eFlow is still widely circulating according to Bank of Ireland (BOI).

he fraudulent messages have been circulating since February, with up to 10 fake eFlow websites being set up by fraudsters in a day.

The fake messages tell the recipient they have outstanding toll charges, directing them to click a link contained in the message to pay the balance.

The website linked to in the text message is not genuine and aims to collect the victim's card and banking details.

"Smishing attacks tend to come in waves, and previously we have seen fraudulent messages appearing to be from delivery services, utility companies, Government agencies or banks," BOI's head of fraud Nicola Sadlier explained.

"But this latest attack, with fraudsters sending messages purporting to come from eFlow, has lasted now for several months, which is unusual."

The bank warned it predicts more fraudulent texts will circulate pretending to be Irish brands over the coming months, "particularly electricity and gas companies," Ms Sadlier said.



"eFlow has advised that they do not send text messages with links to confirm account or payment details. Text messages purporting to be from any company should be treated with extreme caution – the general rule is to stop, think and check," she added.

If you receive a text message that you believe to be a scam, BOI advise that you do not click the link or respond to the message. Instead, take a screenshot of the text and then delete it before reporting the matter to your bank. If you believe you have given your information to a fraudulent website, contact your bank immediately.



EVICTIONS

There has been an outpouring of anger by elected representatives as new figures reveal that more than one hundred households have been evicted into homelessness in the South Dublin County Council area in 2023. The figures were released by South Dublin County Council following a question submitted by People Before Profit Councillor Madeleine Johansson.



outh Dublin County Council confirmed that there had been 116 new presentations to the Homeless Unit because of Notices to Quit from landlords from January to end of May 2023. It was also confirmed that only 4 properties had been purchased in the Palmerstown/ North Clondalkin/Lucan area under the tenant-in-situ scheme. 48 landlords in the area have expressed an interest in selling their property to the council with a tenant in situ.

Councillor Madeleine Johansson commented: "It's absolutely outrageous that more than a hundred households have been evicted into homelessness by private landlords. These are families and individuals who are now in emergency accommodation with no real prospect of finding permanent accommodation.

"I'm myself at risk of homelessness since I received a Notice to Quit from my landlord last October so I know the stress and trauma that these people are going through. It's a disgrace that successive Fianna Fail and Fine Gael governments have refused to build public housing and relied on the private market for housing. This policy has completely failed for ordinary people while lining the pockets of landlords and developers."

People Before Profit TD for Dublin Midwest Gino Kenny added: "I'm getting more and more people contacting my office because they are at risk of homelessness or already homeless. People are spending years in emergency accommodation because they just can't find any private rented homes.

"It's absolutely infuriating to see that only 4 properties have been bought by South Dublin County Council under the tenant in situ scheme in the Palmerstown/Lucan/North Clondalkin area. This was supposed to be the government's solution to prevent homelessness. It's clearly not working and we need urgent action now to tackle the housing emergency.

"We need to re-instate the eviction ban to prevent any more families and individuals ending up in homelessness."



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
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

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
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
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he DMR West includes Blanchardstown, Finglas, and Cabra, along with other areas in South Dublin. Recent data reveals approximately 15,000 active criminal investigations in these regions. Around 10% of all Garda resignations are from DMR West Garda Stations. Figures from the Joint Policing Committee for Fingal, or which I am a member, clearly indicate that Blanchardstown Station is understaffed and lacks resources, putting immense pressure on its members and exacerbating issues due to population density and demographics.

The recent data from the Central Statistics Office highlights the challenging policing reality in Dublin 15 within the DMR. With a population close to 100,000, comparable to Limerick City, Dublin 15 is served by only one Garda Station, while Limerick City has three. This is not to suggest reducing resources for Limerick but rather to emphasize the need for additional resources in Dublin 15 and Blanchardstown Station to better serve the community. Since taking office I have lobbied for an additional Station within the Ongar/Hansfield Development. The lack of appropriate manpower and associated resources diminishes the ability of the members and management in Blanchardstown Station in supporting the community to the best of their ability. Something they must do, but something they clearly want to do.

The ongoing Hansfield Strategic Zone residential development adds to the area's population, and other nearby areas like Barnhill and Kellystown are also seeing development prospects. Although no approvals have been granted yet for Kellystown, it is likely that development applications will be submitted in the future. Since taking office I have lobbied for an additional Station within the Ongar/Hansfield Development.

I have communicated with the Minister for Justice who holds statutory responsibility and oversight for policing, to advocate for appropriate resources for Dublin 15. Dublin 15 is clearly being left behind despite senior ministerial portfolios being held by D15 TDs. The residents expect and deserve adequate support, and I eagerly await a positive response and a suitable solution to address this issue.

The five-door family hatchback stands out with styling that is sporty and distinctive, a range of up to 540km, and a chassis designed to stimulate the senses. The front end of the car is characterised by a distinctive LED lighting signature, dynamic bonnet creases and an eye-catching copper CUPRA badge. Contrasting C-Pillars have a floating design, while puddle lights beam the CUPRA logo on to the ground from the door mirrors. The distinctive style of the CUPRA Born continues at the rear, with LED lights that run 'coast-to-coast' for maximum visual impact.

My CUPRA Born 204PS 58kWh review car was finished in Aurora Blue premium metallic paint, and was fitted with optional 20-inch Hurricane Sport Black alloy wheels and Granite Grey Dinamica™ Bucket Seats – in place of standard 18-inch CYCLONE alloy wheels and CUPRA Bucket Seats with SEAQUAL™ Yarn. Additional optional equipment fitted to my review car included an Augmented Reality Head-Up Display and a Protect Pack. 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Blanchardstown shopping centre put up for sale with €725 million price tag



The sale comes months after a €450 million apartment development was approved for a site beside the centre.

is being put up for sale with a price tag of €725 million. The centre, which is Ireland's largest shopping destination, was acquired by current owners Goldman Sachs in a €750 million deal in December 2020. It was bought as part of a package that included two retail parks, external retail units and a fivestorey office block.

the property.

The Irish Times reports that Goldman Sachs have appointed real estate investment bank Eastdil Secured and CBRE to lead the sale. The guide price for the centre is between €650 and €725 million.

Back in January planning permission was secured for a 971 apartment development beside the centre at the white car park. The development will cost around €450 million.

The development will go as high as sixteen storeys and was met with concern by businesses within the centre's retail park. There will be seven blocks within the scheme.

Your History - Your Home Ongar by Mike Power



'All is changed, changed Utterly.....'W B Yeats.

eat's poem underlines the fact that constant change is the order of the day in nature and also in our own lives too. Dublin has been pushing steadily westwards and northwards since the early corporation housing schemes of the '30s and 40s and swallowing up whole countryside's of previously virgin farmland. Certainly, today, Dublin 15 overall is having a housing boom, attracting people from many different backgrounds to set up their homes here. Connections to the Luas green line, easy access to motorways and a pleasant living environment all speak loudly in the areas favour.

Ongar didn't exist on the map until the fabulously-wealthy Aga Khan ('Elder Lord') ,dynasty bought a local Clonsilla stud farm, naming it Ongar ('Grass-Land') Stud


in the 1920s. The Aga Khans were hereditary chiefs of one group of Indian Shiite Muslim's and closely allied to the British of those imperial times. The family always had an interest in bloodstock and breeding horses, so it was natural they'd find their way to the flat and fertile farms of west Dublin.

The family had been buying land all over Ireland then. Older readers will recall the 'Aga Khan' trophy being the main event contested for in the international horse-jumping shows at the Dublin horse show. In fact, this whole area of Dublin 15 has become home to many horse-breeding establishments.

Ongar, straddling the Dublin-Meath border as it does today, has now developed into a vibrant, prosperous and multicultural locality. Interesting to note that the







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population of Blanchardstown in 1837 was a mere 57 houses and 342 souls. In 2022 the figures stood at 70,000, the size of a small city.

The last thing you would have connected with this very rural part of dublin 15 would have been the glitz and glamour of the capital of the film world, Hollywood. This is how it happened...

In 1949, the Aga Khan of that day had married the pin-up girl of those days, Rita Hayworth. Rita was born Margarita Cansino in Brooklyn in 1918. Her dad was of Spanish origins, giving Rita the sultry good looks that made her name.

Posters of Rita posing attractively with her flamered hair and 'girl- next -door' looks were an ubiquitous feature of many American G'Is barracks.

She made her film debut, aged only 16 yrs, in a film called Dante's Inferno in the 1930s.Rita made over 61 films, many of them during World War 2, when she established herself as the popular pin-up for US forces abroad long with her fellow sex-symbol Betty Grable.

Film buffs of the Shawshank Redemption (Oct 1994) will recall a poster of Rita covering the escape hole for the Andy Dufresne character in that film. Rita was married 5 times but often said that Ireland (and Ongar Farm) was a very special place for her, and she continued to visit the

place, even though no longer married to the owner!

Hollywood was a cut-throat business then. In order to improve her looks she changed her natural brunette hair to ginger–red and had electrolysis to raise her eyebrows and smoothen her forehead. In 1949 her lips were voted 'best pout of the year' by united artist guild! One major hit film for her was You Never Looked Lovelier (1942) with Fred Astaire. Astaire agreed that Hayworth was one of the finest dancers he'd ever worked with.

Finding roles hard to come by in the 1960s, she did a lot of tv work instead. Her last film role was in a film called 'The Last Wrath of God' 1972. Sadly, Rita had been developing the symptoms of early-onset dementia exacerbated by her chronic alcoholic habit in her 40s, making it very hard for her to remember her lines. She passed away in 1987, aged 68 yrs.

In 2001, Manor homes bought Ongar farm, promising to build 243 homes there. Today the count stands at over 2,000. The 'Ongar House' we see today is just a facsimile, the original building having burnt down in Sept 2002. Another famous house in this locality, Luttrelstown House, was the scene of 'Posh' and 'Beck's' marriage in July 1997.

This is Ongar, a place with a showbiz heritage and a bright exciting future!



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
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New PEUGEOT 408 is a Redefined Family Car

When you feast your eyes on the all-new Peugeot 408, you may wonder is it a family hatchback, an executive saloon, or a coupe-SUV? While the stunning 408 could fit comfortably into any of the three categories, it is described by Peugeot as a 'dynamic fastback' saloon that sits between the 3008 SUV and the 508 large family saloon in their current model line-up. The striking shape of the new Peugeot 408 is characterised by its dynamic inspirational stance, and its modern elegance makes it stand out on the road. With ground clearance raised but height retained, its sporty design and fluid lines emphasise its aerodynamic qualities.







Latest Evolution Platform

Underneath the ground-breaking exterior design of the new 408 lies well-proven technology. The car sits on the latest evolution of the EMP2 platform, and is powered by pure-petrol (PureTech) and plug-in hybrid (PHEV) powertrains for now – all of which are linked exclusively to an eight-speed automatic (EAT8) transmission. A fully-electric (EV) version of the new 408 is due to be launched soon, and this will complete the powertrain offerings, as diesel power has been consigned to the history books. With an overall length of 4.69m and a long wheelbase of 2.79m, the new 408 has a remarkably spacious second row, with 188mm of legroom on offer, enabling up to 5 occupants to travel in supreme comfort. Boot space is equally impressive, with 536-litres available behind the rear seats, and up to 1,611-litres available when the rear seats are folded down.

Dynamic Design, Impressive Spec.

The 408's long bonnet is flanked by raised wings that integrate seamlessly, and the dynamic front grille (body-coloured on GT models) features the new Peugeot badge identity. The black decorative scoops surrounding the 'fang-lights' emphasise the robustness of the front end. The rear of the car features inverted cut-out's in the bumper, and 'cats ear' shapes at the back of the roof direct the air flow around the car for optimised aerodynamics. Additionally, robust black wheel arch and lower door protectors not only provide terrific visual drama, but they also offer an enhanced feeling of safety. The new 408 is available in Allure, Allure Pack and GT trim levels across both PureTech and PHEV powertrains and, as we have come to expect from Peugeot, all trim levels are very well equipped in terms of standard specification, safety, comfort and driver assistance systems. The latest-generation PEUGEOT i-Cockpit™ adorns the 408's spacious cabin, and the compact multi-function steering wheel, 3D instrument unit with 10" digital display and 10" HD central touch-screen (model dependent) offers high-quality ergonomics and technology. A full suite of driver assist systems enhance occupant comfort and peace-of-mind when on the move, and the 408 also comes with the reassurance of a fivestar Euro NCAP safety rating.

Car on Review

My review car was a new 408 GT 1.2-litre PureTech 130PS which looked exquisite in its Nera Black metallic paintwork and contrasting 19" diamond-cut alloy wheels. The 3-cylinder petrol engine is quiet and enthusiastic in equal measure and, with an official WLTP fuel efficiency figure of 5.9I/100km on a combined driving cycle, it is frugal too. The eight-speed automatic transmission (EAT8) helps the 408 to maintain its smooth and refined nature whether it is weaving through congested city streets or cruising at motorway speeds. A drive mode selector button next to the gear selector enables drivers to choose between Eco, Normal and Sport modes for a more personalised driving experience. The car pulls cleanly away from a standing start, and the car feels supple and composed at all times. The small steering wheel does give the new 408 a sporty feel, and the steering responses are quick and direct, but Peugeot has managed to mix sportiness with a comfortable ride quality too. There is plenty of grip in corners, and minimal amounts of body roll, while the car glides over rough roads in a relaxed manner. Key standard features in top-spec GT trim include rear privacy glass, a 180-degree colour reversing camera with front & rear parking sensors, keyless entry, push-button start, multi driving mode selector, 19-inch alloy wheels, gloss black rear cluster connecting strip, Connected 3D Navigation, PEUGEOT i-Connect (activated by using "OK PEUGEOT"), wireless Android Auto and Apple CarPlay™, driver and front passenger comfort seats, high beam assist, and signature LED daytime running lights, along with Active Safety Brake, and a Drive Assist Pack consisting of Rear Cross Traffic Alert, Adaptive Cruise Control with Stop & Go function, and Long Range Active Blind Spot Detection.

Verdict & Pricing

The new PEUGEOT 408 is a distinctively-stylish, comfortable, spacious and dynamic family car that is sure to find favour with buyers who appreciate all that the 408 has to offer.

The new 408 is priced from €39,995 and is on sale now.





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


ORA FUNKY CAT 300-420KMS





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ORA Funky Cat EV is more than just a car by Declan Glynn





The 100% electric ORA Funky Cat is a stylish and tech-filled small family hatchback that is now on sale in Ireland. ORA is part of the Chinese multi-brand Great Wall Motor (GWM) empire, and having the expertise of the largest manufacturer of SUVs in mainland China behind it, ORA promises to be a force to be reckoned with in the ever-increasing EV market. ORA's car's invite everyone to get to know them with playful, curvilinear bodies that feel like a smile rather than the aggressive, sci-fi curves of many all-electric rivals.

Facial Recognition Software

The Funky Cat (and all future models from ORA) want to get to know the driver with voice and facial recognition software so that all you have to do is slide in, fasten your seatbelt and begin your journey. To keep occupants safe on a journey, the Funky Cat is packed with nextgeneration driver-assistance systems, such as a 360-degree camera to see places drivers can't. As a result, the Funky Cat reaped a fivestar rating in the NCAP safety test, and was awarded the title of the 'Safest Small Car'. The overall length of the Funky Cat is 4.23m, so it is a similar size to the Mini Countryman, VW ID.3 and MG4 EV, and its 2.65m wheelbase provides occupants with decent amounts of head and leg room. Boot capacity measures in at 228 litres behind the rear seats, with up to 858 litres on offer when the rear seats are folded down.

Two Trim & Battery Options.

There are two generously-equipped trim variants in the ORA Funky Cat line-up. The entry-level 300 PRO has a 48kWh battery capacity that provides a driving range of up to 310km, while the top-spec 400 PRO + comes with a larger 63kWh battery for a range of up to 420km on a WLTP combined driving cycle. Both trim variants produce 171PS and 250Nm of torque, and the power is sent to the cars' front wheels. Key standard 300 PRO specification includes guilted leatherette seats, electric front seats, power-folding door mirrors, 18-inch alloy wheels adaptive cruise control, 360-degree surround camera, wireless phone charging, auto LED headlights with high beam assist, blind spot detection, traffic jam assist, lane keep assist, lane centring function, rear cross traffic alert & brake, keyless entry & start, auto A/C, voice & facial recognition, reversing camera, rear parking sensors, satellite navigation, and a 10.25" digital instrument cluster, along with a 10.25" touchscreen display. Upgrading to the 400 PRO + variant will bring with it an opening panoramic sunroof, power tailgate, heated & ventilated front seats, massage function on front seats, memory function on electric driver seat, heated steering wheel, rear privacy glass, front parking sensors, and auto park assist. There are four exterior colour

options to choose from, along with the option to have a contrasting roof colour. In a similar fashion, buyers can choose an interior trim colour for ultimate personalisation. The Funky Cat can be charged via a 7kW domestic wallbox (15-80%) in around 3h 15m (300 PRO) or 4h 20m (400 PRO+), with a 20-80% charge at a DC fast charging station taking just 39 minutes for the 300 PRO and 45 minutes for the 400 PRO + model.

Car on Review.

My review car was a Funky Cat 400 PRO + in Celestial Blue with a contrasting white roof and door mirror casings. With 171PS and 250Nm of torque on offer, the car can complete a 0-100km/h sprint in just 8.2-seconds and it can reach a top speed of 160km/h (where the law allows). Electric vehicles (EVs) benefit from an instant surge of power from a standing start, and the Funky Cat is no exception, as it pulls away smoothly and with great urgency. The well-judged suspension soaks up road imperfections with ease, making it one of the more comfortable EVs in this regard, while light steering makes parking manoeuvres a simple task. The car has a single pedal driving mode that proves very useful in city traffic, as the regenerative braking can stop the car without the need for driver input, and the energy normally lost through braking is returned to the battery to enhance the driving range. The dashboard in the Funky Cat is covered in soft and supple materials that provide a premium look and feel.

Conclusion & Pricing.

The ORA Funky Cat is distinctively styled inside and out, and it has a relatively plush interior that can accommodate up to five occupants. Excellent levels of standard equipment across both trim variants, along with a comfortable driving experience and cutting-edge safety tech provide the Funky Cat with commendable likability. The 300 PRO is currently priced at just €33,495 with the top-spec 400 PRO + priced at €41,495 (inclusive of an SEAI Grant of €3,500 for private buyers).

uring a recent area committee meeting, my motion, "That the Chief Executive writes to the National Transport Authority to request that they prioritise delivery of the N8 orbital bus route which will provide a sustainable transport option for residents in Dublin 15 accessing Dublin Airport" was agreed. It is vital that the NTA prioritise this project which is currently scheduled for delivery in 2025. The N8 orbital bus route will serve as a beacon of sustainable travel, address parking challenges at the airport, and greatly enhances the overall accessibility of the region.

Dublin 15, one of the fastest-growing areas in the city, currently lacks a direct transport link to Dublin Airport. The absence of this crucial connection poses numerous challenges for both residents and businesses in the region. The N8 orbital bus route bridges this gap, offering an efficient and seamless commute for passengers traveling between Dublin 15 and the airport.

Dublin Airport is a bustling hub that caters to millions of travellers annually. However, the exorbitant parking charges imposed at the airport create a financial burden for passengers. o you know the hidden gem that is the parkland at Abbotstown House on the Sport Ireland Campus? This green oasis bordered by the N3 and M50 is a haven of green tranquility close to Blanchardstown village. And every Saturday morning at 9:30 a group of local volunteers host a free 5km parkrun there. parkrun is a community event where you can walk, jog, run volunteer or spectate.

The course is on the grass and woodland trails of the international cross country course where the European Championships were held in 2021. On any Saturday morning you will see people of all ages running and walking the course. Some bring their dog, other energetic parents push buggies. Everyone is welcome to come along; parkrun is positive, welcoming and inclusive. There is no time limit and no one finishes last.

The local team of volunteers who started the parkrun at the Sport Ireland Campus in October 2021 always welcome newcomers. To join in simply register at https://www.parkrun. ie/register/?eventName=sportirelandcampus You only need to register once whether walking, jogging, running, volunteering or a combination. And yes, some people do the parkrun and volunteer on the same day.

So far, over 1,200 runners and walkers have completed a parkrun at the Campus. Some are occasional parkrunners and others return week after week to do the 5km and to meet up for a chat. Most weeks there are sixty to seventy participants and volunteers mostly from around Dublin 15 but visitors from as far away as Australia have popped by for a run.

The entrance to the Sport Ireland Campus is on the Snugborough Road and there is loads of parking right beside Abbotstown House.
