Progress is being made to improve disability services

For too long, Ireland had fallen short in addressing the needs of people with disabilities.

owever, slowly but steadily, progress is being made to improve disability services in this country.

The UN Convention on Rights of Persons with Disabilities sets out the rights and freedoms to which every person with a disability is entitled.

When Ireland signed up to it in 2018, it was a crucial step towards building a fairer and more inclusive society, where everyone is valued equally, and where people with disabilities are empowered to live their lives as they choose.

Part of the UN Convention is the 'Optional Protocol', which says that, if someone believes their rights have been infringed and Ireland is not living up to its obligations under the Convention, they can take a case directly to the UN.

Despite ratifying the Convention itself in 2018, Ireland did not sign up to the Optional Protocol at the time.

My view is that the Optional Protocol was so vital that we needed to change that.

That is why I pushed for it to be progressed by this Government, and I was proud that, earlier this month, Government agreed to ratification.

This is a major milestone for people with disabilities in Ireland. It will mean a person with a disability can take a case directly to

the UN, and that this Government and future Irish Governments will be held to account in an international forum.

I believe this will act as a catalyst to government departments and state agencies to continue improving the lives of people with disabilities.

Alongside this we also need to invest in services for people with disabilities. Budget 2025 represents a significant investment in disability services, with an allocation of \in 3.2 billion. This represents a \in 1.2 billion increase since 2020, a 58% rise over five years.

We have ring-fenced €10 million to address the Assessment of Need backlog. €106.6 million will be allocated to address the fullyear costs of this year's expected delivery on priority residential places. It will also support the transition of under 65s from nursing homes to more appropriate housing in the community.

€30.8 million will be invested in respite and supports to assist people in continuing to live in their own homes.

I believe that we must continue to build on this, ensuring people with disabilities can realise their rights, while investing in services to support them.





GRANARD BRIDGE PROJECT APPROVED IN CAPITAL PROGRAMME

Good news for anyone using Granard Bridge, Castleknock:

• RPS Consulting Engineers were appointed to provide engineering services for walking and cycling projects in Dublin 15 and their first job will be appointment of a design team for the proposed pedestrian and cycling bridge at Granard Bridge near Castleknock train station.

• Funding of €1.15 million from 2025 to 2027 for this pedestrian-cycle bridge was approved in the Council's Capital Programme, following a local objective which I proposed for the Fingal Development Plan.

UPDATE ON LAUREL PLAYGROUND

Following lots of queries about the Playground for Laurel Lodge, I asked a question at our last Area Committee meeting and got the following update from the Parks team:

'Tender documents for the design & build of the Laurel Lodge Playground are in the final stage of preparation and are expected to be published in the coming weeks...' Funding is in place for the Playground which is due to be completed in early 2025.

HALLOWEEN EVENTS & AMNESTY

I have had a lot of complaints from residents about fireworks and stockpiling of material for bonfires in the run-up to Halloween. Illegal fireworks are dangerous, particularly to children, and harmful to wildlife in parks and green spaces.

Fingal Council is offering residents of Fingal an amnesty, when combustible materials (beds, sofas, wooden doors etc.) will be accepted free of charge at Coolmine Recycling Centre from Wednesday 23rd until Thursday 31st October, with a final entry time of 3pm each day. PLAN TO MOVE ÉRIU COMMUNITY COLLEGE SHOULD BE RECONSIDERED - SECOND LEVEL SCHOOLS NEEDED FOR BOTH HOLLYSTOWN & ONGAR

The Department of Education recently announced a plan to move Eriu Community College from Hansfield to Hollywoodrath from August 2028. This plan is fundamentally flawed and fails to meet the needs of two local communities. Hollystown is a rapidly growing area which should have a new, permanent school on the proposed site, while Ériu CC should be guaranteed a permanent building in Ongar/Hansfield.

Unfortunately, this is yet another example of failure by the Department to plan for future school enrolments in a rapidly



expanding area. At least 1200 homes have received planning permission for Barnhill and Barnwell in the next 5-10 years and another permanent school building is desperately needed in Ongar.

I have put down a motion to our local Area Committee calling on the Department of Education to provide two post-primary schools, one in Ongar and one in Hollystown and have written to Minister for Education Norma Foley TD directly urging her to reconsider the original decision.

SPECIAL NEEDS EDUCATION CRISIS IN DUBLIN 15

Government ministers recently announced the establishment of a Task Force for Dublin 15 to address the devastating shortfall in appropriate school places for children with additional educational needs. A dedicated task force including parents of children with additional needs is a welcome step, but much more needs to be done to resolve the special needs education crisis in Dublin 15. I am campaigning for the following urgent measures:

- Deliver special classes in every primary and second-level school.
- Reverse the cut in special education teachers for
- 70% of national schools in Dublin 15.

•Ensure school principals and staff receive specialised support, training and services and are not left on their own to support vulnerable children.

• Guarantee essential supports, including a full time behavioural therapist, for all students in Danu Community Special School. Working with Cllr Mary McCamley



Sausage, pumpkin and sage casserole

The cold nights are here. Warm yourself up on a Halloween night with this comforting dish. It's also a great way to use up any leftover pumpkin

Ingredients

- 50g/1¾oz butter
- 6 good-quality sausages, pricked several times with a fork
- 1 onion, peeled, thinly sliced
- 3 banana shallots, peeled, finely chopped
- 2 garlic cloves, peeled, finely chopped
- 1 tbsp chopped fresh sage
- 1 small pumpkin, peeled, seeds removed, cut into equal-sized pieces
- 1 tbsp white wine vinegar
- 1 tsp caster sugar
- 200g/7oz canned chopped tomatoes
- 400g/14oz canned cannellini beans, drained, rinsed
- 500ml/18fl oz chicken stock
- · salt and freshly ground black pepper
- 2 tbsp chopped fresh flatleaf parsley, to serve

Method

1. Preheat the oven to 180C/350F/Gas 4.

2. Heat half the butter in a large casserole over a medium heat and fry the sausages for 4-5 minutes, or until golden-brown all over.


3.Add the remaining butter, onion and shallots and fry for three minutes, or until softened. Add the garlic and sage leaves and cook for a further three minutes, stirring well.

4. Add the pumpkin and stir the mixture until well combined. Increase the heat to high and add the white wine vinegar. Continue to cook until most of the liquid has evaporated.

5. Add the sugar, tomatoes, cannellini beans and stock and season, to taste, with salt and freshly ground black pepper.

6. Bring the mixture to the boil, then transfer the casserole to the oven for one hour, or until the sausages are cooked through and the pumpkin is tender.

7. To serve, ladle the casserole into two large bowl and sprinkle with the flatleaf parsley.

CASTLEKNOCK RAILWAY STATION


Yet another great advantage of living in Dublin 15 is the ready availability of connections with our capital city. - By Mike Power



oads, canals, and railway, each in their turn, played their historical part in forging these routes into our capital city. In particular, the advent of railways in Ireland in the 1840s proved a game-changer in terms of the efficient and (relatively!) fast transport of passengers and heavy goods across country-wide and standardised wide-gauge tracks.


Railways ushered in the decline of canals, which were expensive to build and maintain. Before railways, the transport of heavy goods like coal, turf and barrels of Guiness was the exclusive preserve of canal boats pulled by horses, who walked alongside on towpaths at no more than walking pace. Dublin 15's Royal Canal was opened in 1817.

The invention of steam engines totally radicalised technology in the Victorian era. Industrialists , builders, and engineers now had to hand a powerful motive force, far exceeding the limited power of men, horses, or water. With the application of steam, the Industrial Age proper began, and people and goods were transported faster than they ever had before!



The Original 'Blanchardsown' Station(1845)

In 1845 the Great Midland Western Railway (GMWR) company received royal assent from Queen Victoria to build a railway from Dublin to Mullingar and to buy the Royal canal. Construction began in January 1846 and proceeded westward it stages. 'Blanchardstown' station as it was called then, opened in 1849 at Castleknock. This original station ran parallel to the 12th lock of the canal, a



fact still appertaining today.

The short-sightedness of Irish government communications planning in the 1930s and 40s led to much of this extensive railway system being actually torn up. Castleknock station itself was closed in 1937. This station was later demolished in the late 1980s to make way for the M50.

The 'new' modern Castleknock' railway station was built close by and began serving passengers in July 1990. The platforms were lengthened in 2000 as part of an upgrade of the Western Commuter Service. The station was further upgraded in 2012 with new shelters and signage. You can still see the stone bridge of the original station located at the eastern end of the site.

Sadly, the atmospheric nostalgia we all associate with Agatha Christie's depiction of railway stations and trains for murder mysteries is missing from this once Victorian heritage station. Iron lanterns, gothic latticed windows, and comfortable waiting -rooms with cosy turf fires on Winter days are some of my own fond memories of the railway station in Kildare where I grew up.

No station staff in their round hats, shiny buttons, or uniforms anymore ,only anonymous ticket dispensers servicing busy and harassed commuters. Ah, changed times on our railways indeed!







Dublin, around 500 years ago in the 16th century (specifically the early 1500s), was a city that stood at a pivotal moment in its history.

t was still relatively small compared to modern standards, but it was already an important political, economic, and cultural centre in Ireland. The city's landscape, population, and society were heavily influenced by its Norman heritage and the broader political changes occurring in Ireland and Europe at that time. Here is an overview of what Dublin was like during that period:

1. Norman and Medieval Influence

Dublin in the 1500s was a walled medieval city. The heart of the city was centred around Dublin Castle, which served as the administrative headquarters for the English Crown in Ireland. The castle was both a fortress and a symbol of English power and authority in the region.

2. Population and Urban Life

The population of Dublin at this time was relatively small, with estimates suggesting that it housed around 10,000 inhabitants. Most of the residents were either Anglo-Normans or descendants of the earlier Viking settlers, mixed with the native Irish. The Pale was a fortified zone that included parts of Dublin, Meath, Louth, and Kildare. The areas outside the Pale were largely controlled by Irish chieftains, and there were frequent conflicts between these native Gaelic lords and the English authorities. The city's governance was strongly influenced by the Crown, and Dublin's strategic importance meant that it was a focal point for political and military operations in Ireland.

6. Architecture and Fortifications

Dublin's medieval architecture was characterized by its defensive structures, including city walls, gates, and towers. The medieval street plan included areas like High Street and Christchurch Place, which were close to key landmarks like Christ Church Cathedral and St. Patrick's Cathedral, both of which were already centuries old by this time. These cathedrals were significant religious and cultural centres for the city.

7. Social Structure and Life

The society of Dublin in the 16th century was hierarchical. The English elite, including merchants, landowners, and officials, occupied the upper social strata, while the native Irish and lower-class labourers were often marginalized. Guilds played a significant role in the city's economy and governance, controlling various trades and crafts. Social life in Dublin was influenced by the seasonal markets, fairs, and religious festivals, which were focal points for community gathering and entertainment.

Conclusion

Dublin 500 years ago was a city deeply marked by its medieval roots, with a growing influence from English rule that shaped its political and social landscape. It was a bustling trade centre with a mixed population of Anglo-Normans and native Irish, struggling with the beginnings of religious upheaval and the broader changes that would eventually lead to significant shifts in Irish society. The city's identity as both a defensive stronghold and a centre of commerce laid the foundations for its development into the capital of Ireland in the centuries to come.

'Locate the National Genetics and Genomic Testing Laboratory to Connolly Hospital in Blanchardstown'

he Government has a once off golden opportunity to show it has some respect for the public purse by relocating the.

That's according to Aontú Cllr Ellen Troy who says that despite the staggering sums of money being spent on the new Children's Hospital, lack of space is being cited as the reason why the Lab can't be located there, a situation she describes as 'baffling'.

She says:


"We will soon be the proud owners of the most expensive children's hospital in the world which in itself is quite incredible, yet despite the exorbitant cost it still can't cater for all the services that should be located there". "You actually couldn't make it up".

"We are being told that the cost is so high as it will be a one stop shop for everything, but this is patently untrue ".

"The National Genetics and Genomic Testing Lab is a vital service and is used for the testing of rare diseases. It is currently being done in Crumlin and the decision as to its new location apparently rests with the HSE".

"It makes perfect sense to locate this facility at Blanchardstown Hospital, there is lots of room there".

"If not, then the Government will spend a fortune sending tests to private labs abroad. It is nonsensical and displays a complete lack of lateral thinking and frankly, ineptitude".



Domestic abuse cases are continuing to climb in Dublin West.

Aontú Cllr Ellen Troy, a candidate for Dublin West in the upcoming General Elections says her party uncovered the appalling statistics following a PQ from her party leader, Peadar Tóibín TD.

Cllr Troy says

"It is deeply concerning that domestic abuse incidents are rapidly increasing in Dublin West, 4,582 cases last year in Dublin West is absolutely shocking. Domestic violence is a heinous crime and it damages the entire family who live in fear and it can often have lifelong repercussions".

"It's not just in Dublin West however, the number of reported domestic abuse incidents have increased from 14,264 in 2014 to a shocking 46, 539 countrywide last year. Sadly, this dark trend is continuing this year. There are now 128 garda call outs for domestic abuse incidents every day of the year. Behind every one of these figures, is a person being damaged, in what should be, the sanctuary of their own home. In the vast majority of cases, this abuse is being carried out against women. The truth is, Ireland is becoming a more dangerous place for women. I don't believe for a second that the government is tackling the causes of this abuse within society or providing the necessary support to those affected".

"A report commissioned by Women's Aid In a study commissioned by Women's Aid (Sexual Exploitation Research and Policy (SERP)shows Ireland ranks 43 for watching porn sites. Violence

is becoming more and more prevalent and much of what features in mainstream porn is sexual violence".


"In Dublin West, we have the wonderful Sonas Refuge which is doing incredible work but it is underfunded and under resourced. It needs more funding as a priority as it is literally a lifesaver for women and children fleeing their homes".

"The collapse in the number of Gardaí during the term of this Minister for Justice is making it harder to protect citizens. There is a lack of resources to provide interventions to stop children witnessing domestic abuse, so they are not conditioned to repeat physical or psychological violence in their own lives. The government is refusing to tackle the proliferation of hard-core porn being consumed by children. More than 1 in every 3 pornographic videos depicts sexual violence or aggression against women, and children as young as ten are consuming this material every day".

"There has been a 200% increase in cocaine abuse since 2017 and a sharp rise in the number of people with multiple addictions. Our mental health services only receive 6% of the overall health budget and chronic underfunding is having a serious societal impact. The housing crisis and the lack of safe rental move-on options also add to the pressure. There are still nine counties in Ireland that do not have a refuge centre for women and children facing domestic violence. This is an indictment against government inaction. And there is no doubt that the long harsh Covid lockdowns are playing a role in the increase of these figures".

"Aontú is calling on the government to take this issue seriously. By seriously we mean the provision of the necessary resources, changes to the law and societal changes to ensure that Ireland is a safe place for women".
