Adamstown SDZ and delivery of Swimming Pool

As part of my work around everyday issues in Lucan, I identified a requirement for the Adamstown SDZ (Strategic Development Zone) and the Clonburris SDZ to be included in our Council schedule of meetings. I'm delighted to report that following my motions, we now have Quarterly SDZ meetings. This has allowed councillors to review and discuss progress on both Adamstown and Clonburris in greater detail. I've published updates on each meeting and brought issues identified by locals directly to planners on South Dublin County Council. At a recent SDZ meeting I was informed by the planners that they have submitted an application to An Bord Pleanála for proposed non-material amendments to the Adamstown SDZ Planning Scheme in accordance with Section 170A of the Planning and Development Act 2000 (as amended).

Details of these amendments provided to me by senior council planners are as follows:

"To support the on-going delivery of the SDZ and to help council planners manage some of the issues that have arisen since the scheme was adopted, the Planning Authority are now seeking approval for non-material amendments from An Bord Pleanála to aid the delivery of the Planning Scheme and the final build out of Adamstown:"

- "Minor amendment to the phasing requirement in relation to schools. The amendment provides flexibility to allow School Site 4 to be either a primary or a secondary school. Currently this is only permitted to be a primary school."
- "Minor text amendment to current Phase 7 phasing requirement for construction of a leisure centre with a swimming pool. In the context of the delivery of the Lucan pool in the area, the Planning Authority has proposed an amendment to this phasing requirement to broaden the scope of opportunities for community floorspace and/or community gain."
- "Minor text amendment to Quality Bus Corridors wording to reflect current status of National Transport Authority (NTA) guidance (National Cycle Manual) and Bus Connects."
- "Minor text amendment to wording related to the existing option In the Planning Scheme to provide residential units on the potential Fire Station site (In the event that Fire Station Is progressed in Clonburris)."
- "Minor amendment to allow, provided sufficient justification and evidence is supplied, the consideration of timing of phasing requirement by the Planning Authority."
- "Minor amendment to enable transferring of residential units between neighbouring Development Areas."
- "Minor amendment to increase non-residential floorspace requirement in Adamstown Castle Development Area."

"Other minor amendments including updating references, summaries of policy and guidance, updating of typographical errors and other clarifications."

"It should be noted that no changes have been made to the overall unit numbers permissible or the overall phasing requirements set out in the Planning Scheme."

I have raised concerns in relation to some of these proposals in particular "construction of a leisure centre with a swimming pool". I believe that there is no 'equivalent' to swimming pool, a swimming pool is a unique community amenity that serves the whole community and people of all ages. To state that the Lucan pool has been built in the area and use this as a reason to amend the Adamstown policy is disappointing as it has taken myself, and others, nine years to get the pool in Lucan and the community of Lucan thirty years previously. I strongly believe that the Adamstown area needs a leisure centre with pool, it's a brand-new area with a projected population doubling the Lucan/Adamstown area. Most importantly the people of Adamstown were promised a 'Pool' as per the Adamstown SDZ plan and subsequently heavily advertised by developers.

South Dublin County Council planners refer to these as 'minor' amendments.

It's important for residents to be aware that if An Bord Pleanála rule these amendments as 'minor' they don't require public consultation. If they are deemed 'major' changes then they will go out for public consultation. The decision was due over the summer months however at time of print no decision has been made.

Why we see more spiders and insects inside our homes in autumn

The tell-tale signs that autumn is here are clear to us; the days are getting shorter, and the temperature is decreasing.



e take this as a sign to pull out our winter woollies and think about turning on the radiators. But how do insects know that winter is coming? And what do they do to prepare?

Folklore has suggested over the years that insects and other invertebrates can predict the weather and that, for example, we could start to see bigger spider webs if the weather is going to get colder. The evidence for those bigger webs ahead of bad weather is weak. But there certainly are changes in insect behaviour we can see at this time of year, and it shows they are predicting is which may also be important in humans

changes they need to make as the weather changes.

Insects are extremely sensitive to changes in the environment and change in light is the main cue that insects use to signal the change in seasons. Insects, like humans, detect light with their eyes. But unlike humans insects have more than two eyes. In addition to the two big compound eyes that they have on the front of their heads most insects also have three smaller eyes on the top of their heads called ocelli. Light information is passed from their eyes to the brain and interpreted by an internal clock to detect the changing seasons,

and other primates.

Responding to the changing seasons is really important for insects as they are cold blooded and can't regulate their own body temperature. But insects have different ways of coping with the oncoming cold weather. Some, like the painted lady butterfly, leave the UK in autumn heading to north Africa where they breed. Others produce their own "antifreeze" proteins that allow them to cope with winter temperatures. However, the majority of insects undergo a slowing down process called diapause, where they essentially sleep for the winter.


At this time of year, these insects, and other arthropods like spiders, are looking for a sheltered place to spend the winter – and this is why we see more spiders in our houses at this time of year. You may also notice groups of insects, like ladybirds, huddled on windowsills and under rocks. These insects will stay protected over the winter and reawaken in spring.

Because of migration, diapause and the natural death of some insects at the end of the summer, you may generally feel there are fewer insects around than just a few weeks ago. But there

are some new ones emerging that we didn't see earlier in the summer. In the south you might spot the beautiful ivy bee which is only active when the ivy is in blossom. Autumn also brings the mass emergence of crane flies, which, although they look a bit like mosquitos, are actually harmless.

You also might notice more wasps visiting flowers to drink the sugary nectar - at this time of year they become very hungry for sugar. Wasps don't really care where they get their sugar fix from and are just as likely to try and steal our sugary drinks as we are enjoying the last of the summer in our gardens or enjoying a walk. Their craving for sugar is actually really beneficial as their visits flowerto-flower, trying to satisfy their insatiable craving, lead them to pollinate flowers just like bees.

For me the most striking sign of autumn is the appearance of a lot of very large bumblebees out visiting the last flowers of the season. These large bees are next year's queens. After being born late in the summer season they mate and stock up on energy before finding a place to hibernate for the winter. When we see them again it'll be an indicator that spring is on its way when the queens emerge from their sleep and make new nests.



Further Lucan Pool Delay Eroding Confidence

An announcement this evening of yet further delays to the much anticipated opening of the Lucan Pool is being met with sheer frustration and calls for greater accountability and consequences for contractors failing to meet deadlines for publicly procured projects.



Ilr Derren Ó Brádaigh was speaking tonight following the news and said. "This evening I received an email correspondence from the Director in South Dublin County Council regarding yet another postponement to the latest expected delivery time for the end of October. This really has become unacceptable. Work commenced on this pool project 5 years ago with an investment in the region of €10m. There have been plausible reasons for delays to a point, including impacts from the Covid pandemic and challenges in the construction industry, however, there is now simply no credibility remaining in the community, in terms of opening times being provided to anyone.

Cllr Ó Bradaigh said. "The contractor has been unable to either increase the resources on site to a sufficient level or to effectively coordinate the work from sub-contractors to meet this month's eagerly anticipated deadline we are being told. There remains an issue with the moveable floor being delivered now and the lead-in time for this could be up to

12 weeks. It would seem to me that we won't be seeing the pool open this side of Christmas. This must bring into focus the system currently in place and consequences in terms of meeting agreed public project contractual arrangements.

Cllr Ó Brádaigh also said. "Previously Council officials stated that the delays were obviously far beyond what could reasonably have been envisaged at the outset of the project. They said at the time that the well-documented significant and unprecedented challenges in construction in recent years, due to various local and global factors outside of the control of the contractor and the Council accounted for considerable delays, but also stated that project management and performance have also contributed to the timeframe.

Ó Brádaigh concluded. "As a councillor, I can no longer offer a response to members of the community that I represent and when asked about works schedules, as I have personally become somewhat sceptical about timelines that we receive in general on project works. This impacts on our own credibility and people's confidence in anything else we say."


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Call for Reopening of the oncepopular Farmleigh/Guinness Bridge

ublic officials from Dublin West, including Deputy Emer Higgins, Cllrs. Kieran Dennison, Siobhan Shovlin, Gus O'Connell, Palmerstown local area representative Sikandar Jahanzab, and Clane Cllr Padraig McEvoy, were present.

Speakers included Joe Byrne of the Liffey Valley Park Alliance, Dr. Paul Corcoran of the Rebuild Silver Bridge Campaign, and Senator Emer Currie. Senator Currie explained why the Office of Public

Works' 2006 Strategy Towards a Liffey Valley Park has to be updated and given top priority.

She stated: "For years, progress has been inhibited establishing a Liffey Valley Park because of a lack of co-ordination across local authorities. the accessibility of the Liffey Valley, and private ownership issues." During the public meeting, I presented my ideas for resolving those problems. These included implementing walking and cycling routes for active transport, improving access to the breathtaking surroundings of the Liffey Valley, and adopting the same cooperative strategy between landowners and the Council that has been successful in establishing trails and greenways in Mayo and numerous other counties



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ISPCC welcomes Budget proposals for improved mental health services for children and young people but notes there's more to be done

ISPCC welcomes Minister Mary Butler's Budget 2024 announcements for children and young people's mental health, in particular the creation of a new central referral mechanism.



his will allow the HSE to triage referrals to the right service ensuring what the Minister refers to as a 'no wrong door' approach. We know first-hand of the frustrations of children and families when they are trying to access appropriate support and end up being moved around from waiting list to waiting list.

app is positive and ought to help with signposting users to the services and supports that are available.

We also welcome the Minister's comments on the important role NGOs, such as ISPCC, play in the delivery of mental-health support services in the community. As an organisation dedicated to supporting children and young people, ISPCC The allocation of funding for a new mental health is recognises the need for systemic change in how

we, as a society, address mental-health concerns. Therefore, it is heartening to hear that a new head has been appointed to lead the work on reforming child and youth mental health.

The Budget 2024 investment is a welcome successor to that contained in Budget 2023. Then, funding was allocated for the first ever Clinical Lead for Youth Mental Health and the establishment of a dedicated National Office for Child and Youth Mental Health. These are both key steps in providing leadership and oversight in this area.

ISPCC Head of Policy and Public Affairs Fiona Jennings says that "we recognise the systemic challenges our mental-health sector faces and believe these can only be overcome by a concerted effort among all stakeholders. The announcement of a triage service to help direct children and young people to appropriate services is hugely welcome and will go some way to alleviating waiting lists.

"However, mental health funding remains a long way off from the 10% target of overall health spending by 2025."

The combination of the proposed triage system, the establishment of the child poverty and wellbeing unit in the Department of An Taoiseach and that mental health may be a spotlight issue in the next national

policy framework for children and young people mean that these initiatives ought to go some way to realising the pathfinder way of working and we welcome this.

Children with complex needs are a group of children who will require a particular focus and all efforts must be employed to ensure they do not slip through the cracks.

There has never been a more important time than now to prioritise the mental health of young people, as families face financial uncertainty, young people tackle new levels of social media pressure and they are exposed to the reality of wars and the aftermath of a global pandemic.





It's that time of year when we are endlessly picking up leaves in our gardens. Why does this happen?

n Autumn, loads of plants (particularly trees) discard their leaves. These are perfect for hopping in, however for what reason do plants do this? It appears to be a waste. However, by dropping their leaves they are saving their supplements for the following summer. For plants to develop, they need daylight, supplements, and water. The supplements and water come from the dirt. The daylight is caught by the leaves.


To catch the daylight, the leaves utilize a compound called chlorophyll, which makes leaves green. Chlorophyll transforms daylight into food, which the trees need to develop, through a cycle called photosynthesis. In summer, plants do loads of photosynthesis, since they get bunches of light and on the ground that it is warm.

The food they make is sugar, which they use to develop new leaves, blossoms, and seeds.

In winter, things are less agreeable. The days get more limited, it gets colder and there is less daylight. As far as you might be concerned, this isn't an issue - on the off chance that you are cold, you can put a coat on. Be that as it may, plants can't do this. Furthermore, when it gets truly cold, and freezes, their leaves can be harmed.

To see how freezing treats various leaves, there is an examination you can attempt at home. Take a few distinct leaves and put them in your cooler, or the refrigerator in your ice chest. Pass on them for a day to get truly cool, then take them out once more. Put them on a plate so you don't make a wreck, then, at that point, simply hang tight for them to heat up (this will take some time).

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

Shining a light on pedestrian visibility in Kildare

he clocks have gone back an hour. Kildare County Council is appealing to pedestrians to be more visible to others while using the road. This time of year, we experience dark mornings and longer dark evenings, which bring additional hazards to road users.

A simple garment such as a high visibility vest or an armband could be a lifesaver when it comes to making yourself visible on the roads. The main purpose of a high-viz vest is to make the wearer stand out from the background so they can be seen more easily, particularly by drivers or other road users. Hi-Viz vests are effective in any light or weather conditions.

Cyclists are also urged to be clearly visible to road users by wearing high visibility clothing such as Hi-Viz vests and reflective armbands in addition to the front and rear lights on their bike.

pedestrians were killed on Irish Roads in 2022. Of the 43 pedestrians killed, 15 occurred between 4pm and 8pm, and 8 between midnight and 4am. Last year, 10 pedestrian fatalities occurred in the month of November.

Initial figures from An Garda Síochána show there have been 38 pedestrian deaths on Irish roads so far this year. The highest in 15 years.

Kildare County Council's Road Safety Officer Declan Keogh said: "Wearing a Hi-Viz vest not only greatly increases your visibility, but it is also a lifesaver. Many of us walk the roads for exercise or leisure, or even just on the way to and from work or school, and with the limited daylight hours from November, we all need to ensure we are making ourselves as safe and as visible as possible, and a simple thing as a Hi-Viz vest is the ideal solution."

As the winter months bring harsher weather conditions and less daylight, Kildare County Council Analysis released from the RSA reports that 43 i are asking all road users to be safe and to be seen.

Budget 2024 is putting money back in carers' pockets

udget 2024 is highlighting the important role played by family carers with an increase in payments and other commitments made by the Department of Social Protection, said a Fine Gael TD.

Deputy Emer Higgins said that Budget 2024 emphasised Fine Gael's commitment to supporting fulltime carers.

"Carers will receive an increase in payments as part of the largest social protection budget package in the history of the State.

"There will be a lump sum payment of €400 to all carers receiving the Carer's Support Grant in November 2023, which will help carers who have been struggling with the cost of living.

"Budget 2024 also includes a €12 increase in Carer's Allowance and an increase of €10 to the Domiciliary Care Allowance, which supports carers for children with a severe disability.

"There will also be a Christmas bonus and a second cost of living payment in January that carers can avail of.

"However, the most significant change is that the income threshold for Carer's Allowance has been increased to €450 for a single person and €900 for a couple. This is the second time the Carer's Means Test has been expanded since Minister Humphreys was appointed and it will mean thousands more carers in Dublin Midwest will now qualify for the full payment.

"We are not only providing more funding, but Minister Humphreys also proposed establishing an Interdepartmental Working Group with the Department of Health to examine and review the entire system of means testing for carers payments. I personally hope this is the first step towards the future abolishment of the means test and a basic income for full-time carers.

"Fine Gael is committed to putting more money in people's pockets by cutting tax and USC. This is the tenth Budget in a row this has happened to reward work and help people keep more of their hard-earned wages. Carers across Dublin Midwest will feel the benefit of this.

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70,000 STUDENTS IN LINE FOR INCREASES IN STUDENT GRANTS INCLUDING 14,893 IN COUNTY DUBLIN – DEPUTY HIGGINS

Budget 2024 puts money back in the pockets of families and students.



eputy Emer Higgins has confirmed that at least 70,000 students, including 14,893 in Dublin are in line to benefit from student maintenance grant increases thanks to Budget 2024.

Budget 2024 has a significant number of measures that will reduce the cost of education and the cost of living for families and students including:

· significant increases in student grants

- cuts to the student contribution fee for undergraduate students
 - increased and extended renters' tax credit
- extended public transport fare discounts for young people

Deputy Higgins said: "This Budget is about putting money into people's pockets, and we know the cost of college is a huge burden for families, especially if they have two children in college.

Fine Gael Deputy Higgins added "The Minister for Further and Higher Education Simon Harris has put forward a package of budget measures that will cut the cost of college for families.

"This includes better grants, reduced college fees and an extension of the rent tax credit. This is Fine Gael ensuring the best start for every young person, while ensuring people get to keep their hard-earned money."

Budget 2024 made a series of changes for students in college.

Fine Gael Deputy Higgins added: "The SUSI maintenance grant which is the main support for students attending higher education will increase by €342 in this academic year between January and May.

"This means that close to 14,893 students in Dublin are in line for an increase in their student grants which will be welcome news to them and their families."

"There are also a number of significant reductions in the fee a student pays.

"Eligible undergraduate students will also receive for a second year in a row a €1000 reduction in the student contribution fee.

"On top of this and in recognition of the cost of living, people with a household income of below €100,000 will :

see their fees halved as they will not only get €1000 off but will also get the €500 student contribution grant from SUSI.

"And if SUSI was paying half your fee, you'll get another €500 off meaning your fee will be €1,000.

"Parents of students will also be glad to hear that the renter's tax credit has been increased to €750 next year.

"Not only is the credit being increased but it's being extended. Indeed, parents who pay for their child's digs accommodation will be able to apply for the renter's tax credit retrospectively for the years 2022 and 2023 where both credits were worth €500 each.

"Public transport' half-price fares are also being extended to people up to their 26th birthday, making the cost of commuting to and from university for instance is much cheaper for our young people.

Deputy Higgins concluded "With the strong economy Fine Gael has built in Government, we will continue to reduce the cost of getting an education and help support families putting their kids through third level education. Minister Harris has delivered a Budget which supports families and ensures more money is back in their pocket."





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
